

## FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

On behalf of LLUH's three licensed hospitals (Medical Center, Children's Hospital, and Murrieta), the Community Benefit team partners with nonprofits in San Bernardino and Riverside Counties to provide direct financial support. We currently support nonprofits in our region in two distinct ways:

1) We accept requests of less than \$10,000 on a rolling basis. Funding is dependent on alignment with strategic priorities, budget availability, and the reporting of outcomes for the proposed request. 2) Once a year between July – September, we open our Community Health Investment Awards. This process invites nonprofits to submit project proposals aimed at addressing the greatest needs in our region as stated in our <u>Community Health Needs Assessment</u>. This formal application process allows applicants to request \$10,000 - \$100,000, is formally reviewed by a committee, and provides funding for projects carried out over the course of the following calendar year (January 1<sup>st</sup> – December 31<sup>st</sup>) as budget allows. *In order to be added to our communication list for the formal opening of the Community Health Investment Awards process, please fill out this form with your organization's information*.

## **CRITERIA FOR FUNDING**

For both funding opportunities listed above, applicants must:

- Be a certified nonprofit organization committed to serving San Bernardino and/or Riverside County
- Address one or multiple of the listed priorities in our Community Health Needs Assessment and the Vital Conditions Framework
- Must serve underserved, low-income, and means-tested (any one of the following)
  - 200% of the federal poverty level
  - Uninsured or underinsured persons, i.e. Beneficiary of Medi-Cal
  - Come from an area specifically known to be low-income
- Serve those from primarily minority populations
- Demonstrate a track record of strong community impact
- Focus on improving health equity in our region
